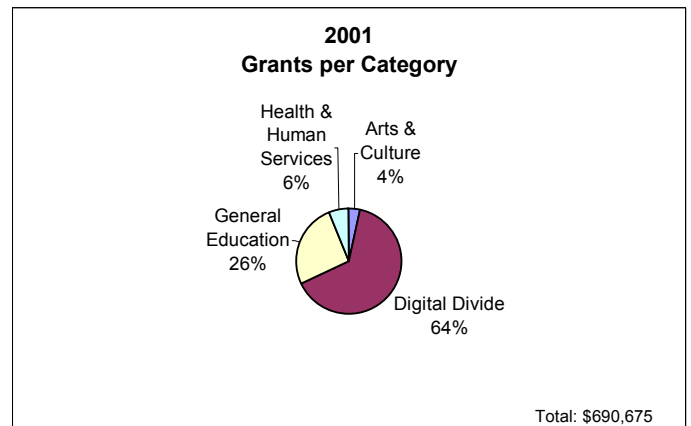
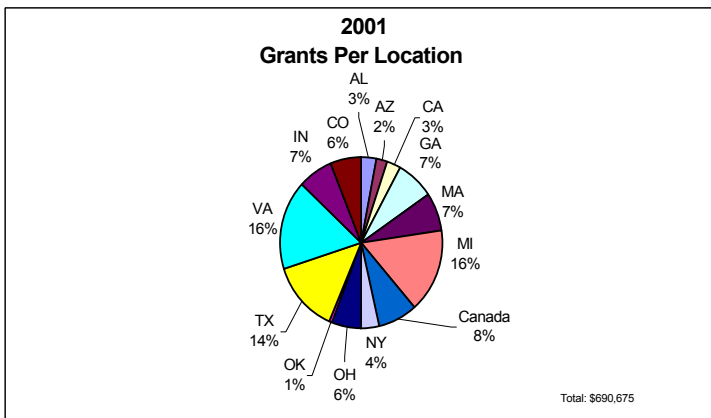


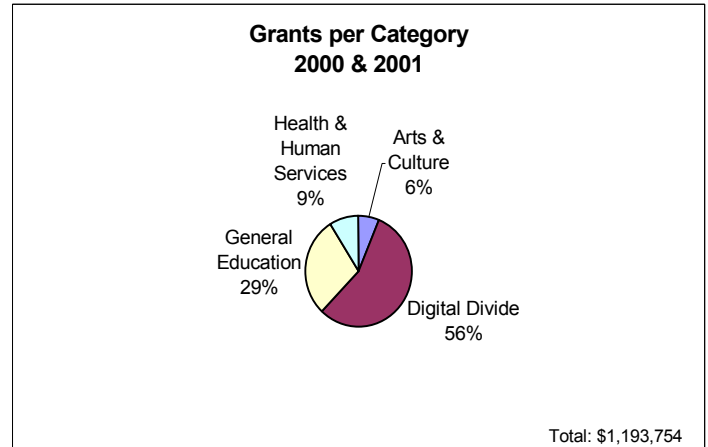
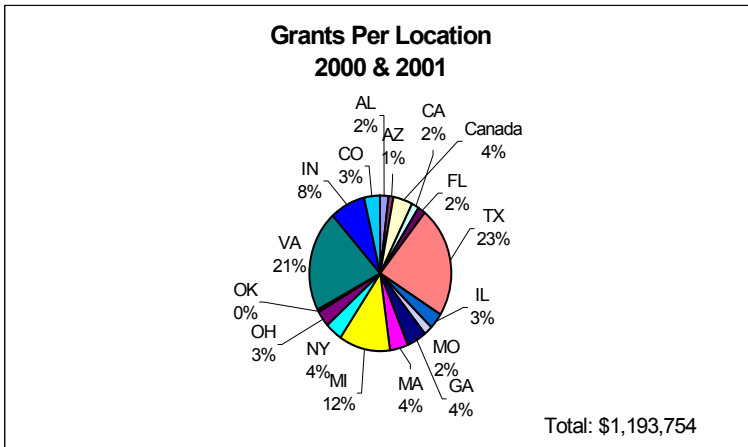
EDS Foundation 2001 Annual Report

- The EDS Foundation was chartered in January 2000 and was funded with EDS stock and cash valued at \$11 million. In April 2001, the EDS Board of Directors authorized an additional contribution of 50,000 shares of EDS stock. As of December 31, 2001, net assets of the Foundation were \$16,377,922.

- Description of grants awarded in 2001:

DIGITAL DIVIDE

Alameda Heights Community Outreach Center – Dallas, TX

The EDS Foundation awarded the Alameda Heights Community Outreach Center a \$5,000 grant in April 2001. The center is a community-based organization that provides social services self-help programs to indigent youth and their families, daily activities for senior citizens, after school programs, parenting education, transportation, and daily hot meals. The foundation grant supports the Alameda Heights Trade School which is a three-level program leading to employability in the construction trades.

Arizona Science Center – Phoenix, AZ

The EDS Foundation awarded Arizona Science Center (ASC) a \$15,000 grant in August 2001. ASC is a nonprofit, educational institution with over 300 hands-on exhibits, a giant-screen theater, a multimedia planetarium and a suite of four classrooms. The Center has a unique focus of science as experienced and applied by people in Arizona including its environment, and scientific and technological contributions. The foundation grant provides funding to expand the JASON program beyond the Phoenix area to hard-to-serve regions of the state. Specifically, scholarships will be provided to teachers to attend train the trainer sessions who in turn will train teachers in their respective areas.

EDS has partnered with the organization and provides volunteer support for JASON Project teacher Internet training and support for JASON broadcasts.

Black Child & Family Institute – Lansing, MI

The EDS Foundation awarded the Black Child & Family Institute a \$9,955 grant in April 2001. For 15 years, the institute has served a multicultural community providing services in the area of health, mental health, education and recreation. Since 1988, in conjunction

with Michigan State University, this organization has provided computer training for adults and children utilizing two computer labs. The foundation grant supports the Close the Gap Program. This program provides access to computer technology, computer training, computer ownership, the Internet, and educational software.

For over three years, EDS has provided support by providing a board member, technical adviser, consultant for curriculum content, computers and mentors.

Cerebral Palsy Research Foundation of Kansas, Inc. – Sacramento, CA

The EDS Foundation awarded the Cerebral Palsy Research Foundation of Kansas, Inc. a \$50,000 grant in August 2001. Begun in 1971, this organization provides individuals with disabilities customized services and support with emphasis on employment and training options, to facilitate economic and personal independence. The funding will support the IT Training and Employment for People with Special Needs project in Atlanta by providing scholarship money for students to participate in the training.

EDS University has made a five-year commitment to provide in-kind management and first year facility set up management support for five years.

Cincinnati Public Schools – Cincinnati, OH

The EDS Foundation awarded the Robert A. Taft IT High School of the Cincinnati Public Schools a \$30,000 grant in August 2001. Robert A. Taft IT High School is the first IT high school in the state of Ohio. The school's curriculum will align with post-secondary institutions and will provide certification opportunities for students. Graduates will have developed competencies in the core high school academic curriculum plus strong IT skills necessary for entry to the job force or progression to post-secondary education IT programs. The foundation grant provides funding for the establishment of a multimedia resource center which will provide on-line research, study and collaboration facilities.

EDS has committed volunteer support through technical consulting, technical and career presentations, mentoring, and internships for the students.

Dallas Urban League, Inc. – Dallas, TX

The EDS Foundation awarded the Dallas Urban League a \$50,000 grant in August 2001. The Dallas Urban League mission is to provide the critical skills, programs and resources necessary to enable African Americans and other disadvantaged persons to move into the economic and social mainstream. The Dallas Urban League's holistic approach includes services and programs in education (GED and literacy), computer/software training and employment. The foundation grant provides funding for the Enabling Communities Through Technology project.

Since 1993, EDS has partnered with the organization providing an executive-on-loan, financial support, participation on the board of directors, and technical consultation and implementation assistance for the Technology Center.

Focus: HOPE – Detroit, MI

The EDS Foundation awarded Focus: HOPE a \$100,000 grant in April 2001. Co-founded in 1968, Focus: HOPE is a civil and human rights organization that initiates practical solutions to hunger, economic disparity, inadequate education and racial

divisiveness. The foundation grant provides general operating support for the evening program at the Information Technologies Center (ITC). The ITC will train young men and women for careers in the IT industry.

For over five years, EDS has provided volunteers, technical support and leadership, and loaned executives.

Heritage Center for Human & Community Development – Pelham, AL

The EDS Foundation awarded the Heritage Center for Human & Community Development a \$10,000 grant in April 2001. Founded in 1998, the center has worked to deploy community resources to effect systemic change. Its primary vision is to better prepare all science students to transition from school to the world of high-tech careers. The foundation grant supports the Alabama Project SEED Teacher Initiative. The SEED project is a performance-oriented learning experience that is a paid 9-week scientific experience that provides science teachers with an opportunity for in-depth scientific training and development with real scientists.

EDS has a history of volunteer involvement at the center and participates on several committees.

JASON Project/Alabama – Hoover, AL

The EDS Foundation awarded JASON Project/Alabama a \$12,000 grant in August 2001. JASON Project/Alabama program provides professional development to familiarize teachers with the content of the JASON Project curriculum and helps them master the use of educational technologies to take maximum advantage of the JASON Web site and the broadcast in their teaching. The foundation grant provides funding for a scholarship program that enables more rural and inner-city schools across the state that have limited resources to participate in the JASON Project.

EDS has partnered with JASON Project/Alabama four years and has committed to an additional four years providing board participation, a project manager, technical support, support and maintenance of the JASON Project/Alabama web site, internet training for teachers, and general volunteer support.

Mathematics & Science Center – Richmond, VA

The EDS Foundation awarded the Mathematics & Science Center a \$16,445 grant in April 2001. Established in 1989, the center was established for the purpose of increasing awareness and raising funds for capital projects and implementation of new cutting-edge programs for teachers and students. The foundation grant supports the implementation of the JASON Project XIII: Frozen Worlds.

EDS participates as a Board member and the center has been an EDS education outreach partner since 1999.

Save Our Youth – Denver, CO

The EDS Foundation awarded Save Our Youth (SOY) a \$41,467 grant in December 2001. SOY's mission is to make a timely intervention in the lives of at-risk youth through mentor relationships, which provide the skills for success in educational, emotional and spiritual development. SOY serves 11-19 year old youth, primarily minority youth

residing in poor urban Denver neighborhoods. The foundation grant provides funding for the Technology Learning Center to train and equip at risk urban youth with practical computer training and knowledge. This will result in personal development for these youths and skills for employment in computer applications, hardware and web development.

EDS has provided technical advisory support and financial support. EDS has committed volunteer support specifically for this project through mentoring and technical support.

Special Olympics Indiana – Indianapolis, IN

The EDS Foundation awarded Special Olympics Indiana a \$49,200 grant in December 2001. Through year-round sports training and competition opportunities for children and adults, Special Olympics Indiana's goal is for all persons with mental retardation to have a chance to become useful and productive citizens. The Foundation grant will provide the second year of funding for the implementation of a three-year technology plan.

EDS has partnered with this organization since 1991 and has provided board involvement, technology consulting and general volunteer support.

University College of Cape Breton – Sydney, Nova Scotia, Canada

The EDS Foundation awarded the Youth Programs of University College of Cape Breton (UCCB) a \$6,509 (10,000 Canadian dollars) grant in August 2001. Youth Programs is a division of the UCCB's Department of Extension and Community Affairs Department. The main objectives of the Youth Programs are to encourage youth in the areas of science, technology and entrepreneurship by providing local opportunities, providing training and education, creating public awareness and drawing on support from parents, educators and the community. The foundation grant provides funding for the Youth Program's summer program. The curriculum of this program focuses on IT programs that include e-business start-up, job shadowing, web page architecture, virtual clustering demonstrations, PC hardware architecture and Internet scavenger hunts.

EDS provides volunteer support through writing curriculum, professional development assistance, committee participation and classroom presentations.

Vancouver Aquarium – Vancouver, Canada

The EDS Foundation awarded the Vancouver Aquarium a \$75,000 (Canadian Dollars) grant in December of 2001. Begun in 1956, Canada's Pacific National Aquarium, is dedicated to effecting the conservation of aquatic life through display and interpretation, education, research, and direct action. The Aquarium is Canada's foremost provider of aquatic education experiences and delivers these to nearly one million people each year. The Foundation grant will establish an AquaNews Community Education Content Channel that links the Aquarium's in-house expertise, community connections and extensive networks of environmental information sources into a conservation-effecting aquatic newsroom.

For over ten years, EDS has provided the aquarium with Technology Committee representation, technical support, and general volunteer support.

OTHER EDUCATION

Big Brothers/Big Sisters of Orange County - Tustin, CA

The EDS Foundation awarded the Big Brother/Big Sisters of Orange County a \$2,000 grant in April 2001. Big Brothers/Big Sisters of Orange County has served thousands of children and their families in this community for over forty years. The organization matches volunteer adults to boys and girls, from families or group homes, who have need of a mentor or adult role model. The Foundation grant supports the expansion of the Tutor Pal Program that provides tutors for children ages 6-10 who are performing below grade level in reading and math.

An EDS employee currently volunteers for the organization.

Equest – Dallas, TX

The EDS Foundation awarded Equest a \$10,000 grant in April 2001. Since 1981, Equest has provided equine-assisted therapy and rehabilitation for children and adults with physical, mental, emotional and learning disabilities. The organization also provides education programs for people working in the field of equine-assisted therapy and conducts research to validate and improve equine-assisted therapy. The foundation grant supports the expansion and improvement of the summer camp program.

EDS provides volunteers and has partnered on multiple Global Volunteer Day projects in the past.

Junior Achievement of Dallas, Inc. – Richardson, TX

The EDS Foundation awarded Junior Achievement of Dallas a \$15,000 grant in April 2001. The organization's purpose is to educate and inspire young people to value free enterprise, business and economics to improve the quality of their lives. Junior Achievement places qualified community volunteers directly in a classroom to help children, kindergarten through grade 12. The foundation grant supports the High School program. This 6-10 week program provides activity-based lessons developed to demonstrate the skills necessary for various careers –from manufacturing to e-business.

EDS has supported Junior Achievement of Dallas, Inc. since 1996. EDS participates through board membership, on-going volunteer support and an annual fundraiser.

Junior Achievement of Greater Tulsa, Inc. – Tulsa, OK

The EDS Foundation awarded Junior Achievement (JA) of Greater Tulsa, Inc. a \$3,500 grant in August 2001. In operation since 1966, JA of Tulsa's purpose is to educate and inspire young people to value free enterprise, business and economics to improve the quality of their lives. JA of Tulsa teaches kids how business works using business professionals who volunteer their time in the classroom to teach economics-oriented lessons. The foundation grant provides funding to implement *JA Personal Finance*, a comprehensive online, Web-based, personal finance literacy program for grades 9-12.

EDS (formerly Sabre employees) provides volunteer support by providing classroom instructors who teach JA curriculum.

OhioReads Foundation, Inc. – Columbus, OH

The EDS Foundation awarded the OhioReads Foundation a \$10,000 grant in April 2001. The organization was formed in June 1999 to support and promote public education in the state of Ohio, especially literacy initiatives. OhioReads is Governor Taft's major education initiative to improve the reading skills of Ohio's K-4 grade students. The foundation grant provides general operating support for the development of reading programs, funding professional development, providing technology to help improve reading skills and recruitment volunteers to tutor.

EDS supports this organization through volunteer tutors, board participation, committee participation, and an annual fundraiser.

United Negro College Fund – Fairfax, VA

The EDS Foundation awarded the United Negro College Fund (UNCF) a \$100,000 grant in December 2001. UNCF's mission is to enhance the quality of education by providing financial assistance to deserving students, raising operating funds for member colleges and universities, and increasing access to technology for students and faculty at historically black colleges and universities. The EDS Foundation grant will fund student scholarships.

EDS will work with UNCF to identify the scholarship candidates.

ARTS AND CULTURE

George Eastman House – Rochester, NY

The EDS Foundation awarded the George Eastman House a \$25,000 grant in April 2001. Founded in 1949, the George Eastman House collects and interprets images, films, literature, and equipment in photography and equipment to inspire discovery and learning for a regional, national and international audience. The Foundation grant supports the exhibition: *In Praise of Nature: Ansel Adams and Photographers of the American West*.

EDS supports this organization through volunteers.

HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

Center for Community Health and Well-Being – Sacramento, CA

The EDS Foundation awarded the Center for Community Health and Well-Being a \$17,488 in August 2001. Founded in 1988, the center serves a critical need within the Sacramento community to educate and assist young men and women about pre-natal and infant preventative care. The Center services and programs includes a clinic, a health education resource center, a male involvement program, parenting and childbirth education, a substance abuse counseling program and two teen pregnancy prevention programs. The foundation grant provides funding for consulting services and equipment required to complete the Management Information System Implementation and Data Compiling project.

EDS has partnered with the organization for over 5 years providing financial, technical, volunteer and in-kind support to the organization.

Rape Crisis Center of Collin County – Plano, TX

The EDS Foundation awarded the Rape Crisis Center of Collin County a \$15,000 grant in April 2001. The center was established in 1982 to provide counseling, education and advocacy to those impacted by sexual assault. The foundation grant supports the SANE (Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner) Project and the purchase of a colposcope which provides comprehensive medical care to sexual assault victims and solid, medically sound evidence with which to prosecute sex offenders.

EDS provides volunteers. One EDS employee has volunteered over 3,000 hours in the last five years and is currently vice president of the board of directors.
